# FOSS - Friends of Stratford Station

A great uncle of mine had been a Station Master at Bewdley, family photos showed a very smart man in uniform standing amid the clean, neat Victorian station garden. Bright white stones, herbaceous blooms.

When we moved to Stratford all those years ago, I always had an idea that the station platforms could be more cared for so when I became a member of Stratford In Bloom I leapt at the

chance of Stratford Station becoming a SiB Community Project. Upshot I adopted the platform in 2017 with the support of SiB, amazing support from London Midland and Stratford Supports, work began. London Midland took down the overgrown Leylandii, cut up the old breeze blocks, laid weed barriers and poured on new gravel. Volunteers had Network Rail basic safety training to work on the platforms, so ready to go.

Covid disrupted our work but once over Friends of Shakespeare Line were on fire, encouraging all stations along the line from Stratford to Moor Street to form a Friends of Stratford Station and plant up all the platforms. All stations now have a Community group weeding, planting, litter picking their stations. The very active local group, Forest of Hearts are an essential support who are doing work on and around the Station. We are a friendly, supportive community. That is our history here in Stratford. I hope you like the results of our work. # **Schools Challenge Results 2025**

#### School and Nursery Challenge

This delightful project is aimed at increasing awareness in young people of the "green" environment. Starting in Nurseries, supporting the teaching staff, our aims are to introduce awareness of insects, birds, bees and appropriate plants and vegetables while using upcycled items and relatively little money while "playing".

As the children get older, helping them to think about composting, collecting seeds and cuttings to enable propagation for the following year. This usually results in a pretty display of pollinating plants and the joys of vegetables and fruit. This year was more challenging than usual with our very hot, dry, long summer.





We had 2 new primary schools join us this year. All the schools and nurseries (led by staff) produced delightful results even though they have variable and very different environments to deal with.

The entries this year were of such a high standard that we found judging very difficult. Well done to all.

# What is the best plant for winter?

What is the best plant for winter? Well, here at Plantscape, we have a few favourites. Creating a space that bursts with colour throughout the colder months can be a delightful challenge. By carefully selecting the right plants, you can enjoy vibrant blooms and lush foliage from autumn through to spring.

Use free-standing planters, barrier baskets, floral towers or hanging baskets to contain a texturally interesting mixture of evergreen shrubs, herbs and hardy flowering plants which give way in spring to flowering bulbs.

#### Pansies

FACT: Pansies are known for their "faces," which are markings that resemble a human face. They come in a wide range of colours and patterns.

WHY THEY'RE GOOD: Pansies are incredibly hardy and can bloom in cooler temperatures, making them perfect for autumn and early spring gardens.

#### Cyclamen

FACT: Cyclamen grow from tubers and are native to the Mediterranean region. They have unique, upswept petals and heart-shaped leaves.

WHY THEY'RE GOOD: Cyclamen bloom in late autumn and winter, providing vibrant colour when many other plants are dormant.

#### **Primrose**

FACT: Primroses are one of the first flowers to bloom in spring, often appearing as early as December in mild climates.

WHY THEY'RE GOOD: Their early blooming period and bright, cheerful flowers make them ideal for adding colour to late winter and early spring gardens.

#### Heather

FACT: Heather is an evergreen plant that can live for up to 40 years. It is known for turning hillsides purple in late summer and autumn.

WHY THEY'RE GOOD: Heather's evergreen nature and late summer to autumn blooms provide consistent colour and structure to gardens throughout the colder months.
